The Duldig Studio: A Living Legacy

The Duldig Studio was established as a not-for-profit public museum in 2002 dedicated to preserving the memory of Karl Duldig and Slawa Horowitz-Duldig, a talented artist couple. It's located in a historic house and garden where you can explore their artwork and learn about their lives. The museum showcases their collection in a way that's both interesting and meaningful. It's a place where you can experience art in a personal and inspiring way. The Duldig Studio is committed to providing a unique and intimate approach to art as a lived experience in an authentic historical setting. Our programs and activities inspire creative journeys for visitors of all ages, backgrounds and abilities.

A Story of Resilience and Reinvention

The Duldig family's journey is a testament to the human spirit's enduring power. Their experience during wartime and displacement highlights the importance of belonging, community, and the transformative role of art. The Duldig story is a beacon of hope for today's world, reminding us of our responsibility to support refugees and displaced people. It's a powerful message for the 21st century: art can bridge divides, inspire change, and enrich the cultural fabric of our nation.

A Passionate Team Driving Our Mission

At the heart of the Duldig Studio is a dedicated group of volunteers, staff and Board Members who generously share their time and expertise. They are passionate about our mission and play a crucial role in our success. Our volunteers greet visitors, share the Duldig family's inspiring story, and support our public programs and events. Our talented staff plan, administer and deliver our operations. Our Board Members provide valuable guidance and support through committees, hands-on projects and strategic planning. Their knowledge and dedication are essential to our ongoing success and sustainability. We are grateful for their commitment to the Duldig Studio.

Board Changes and New Additions

Following the October 2023 Annual General Meeting the Duldig Studio Board made several changes to its composition and roles. Gina Panebianco took a leave of absence and Andrew Dixon stepped into the role of Vice President. In December 2023, we were thrilled to welcome Pralabh Gupta to the Board. His business and strategic knowledge and fresh perspective have been invaluable. We also said farewell to Jess Murray, our Programs & Marketing Coordinator, who returned to the United Kingdom and in April 2024, we warmly welcomed Bella Besen to the team as our new Programs & Marketing Assistant.

Setting Our Course for the Future

At our April planning day, our team of Board Members, staff, and key volunteers came together to shape the future of the Duldig Studio. We outlined our strategic priorities for the next three years which guided our actions throughout the year:

1. Increasing funding diversity and sustainability

To secure our future much of our effort this year was spent on this key strategic initiative, whether applying for grants, approaching foundations or appealing to private philanthropists. We are deeply grateful for the generous financial support we have received from the City of Stonnington, Victorian Government (Public Records Office, Dept of Education and Dept of Families, Fairness and Housing) National Library of Australia, Stuart Leslie Foundation, Vera Moore Foundation, Duldig family members and private philanthropists. Their contributions, along with the invaluable inkind support of our members, donors and sponsors, have been instrumental in sustaining the Duldig Studio and ensuring a bright future for our organisation.

2. Increasing audience development and community

This year was a year of creativity and connection. Once again, we were amazed by the incredible range of programs our small

but dedicated team delivered. From intimate group tours to lively family days, artist talks, music concerts and the launch of a new publication. Our activities reached a diverse audience, from young families to seniors. We offered a variety of creative adult workshops inspired by Karl and Slawa Duldig's art, allowing participants to explore their own artistic talents. The following reports from our Museum Manager and Founder, along with the images throughout this report, showcase the breadth and depth of our offerings and the positive impact they have on our community.

2.1 Enhancing education programs

Our partnership with Monash University Museum of Art (MUMA) continued to flourish in 2023-2024. Through this collaboration, we offered engaging programs aligned with the VCE Visual Arts Study Designs, Art Creative Practice and Art Making and Exhibiting curriculum. Thanks to the generous support of the Vera Moore Foundation, we made significant strides in developing curriculum materials for the compulsory Holocaust studies unit in the Victorian Schools Curriculum. These materials aim to provide educators with valuable resources for teaching this important topic. We are grateful to Gina Panebianco and Melinda Mockridge for their invaluable contributions to nurturing and supporting our education programs.

2.2 Expanding our reach: a strong online presence

This year, we strengthened our online presence, ensuring that our in-person events were captured for future reference. Our online programs attracted a global audience and featured renowned international speaker Laurence Sillars from the Henry Moore Institute, United Kingdom for our 2023 Annual Duldig Lecture on Sculpture. We were honoured to host Laurence Sillars at the Duldig Studio during his Australian visit giving him the opportunity to experience Karl and Slawa Duldig's art firsthand and explore connections to Henry Moore's work. The recording of Laurence Sillars' Duldig Lecture has already been viewed by over 200 people, showcasing the enduring interest in our programs and the valuable insights shared by our speakers.

3. Developing capacity for program delivery and collections management

Our development project 'Space to Create' has achieved significant milestones this year. The building design has been finalised and approved by Stonnington Council, paving the way for expanded collection storage, public access to all heritage rooms, a new workshop opening directly onto the Sculpture Garden and facilities to accommodate visitors with disabilities. This long term project is being made possible through generous and recurring financial support from family and friends of the Duldig Studio enabling us to grow our balance sheet reserves in anticipation of the multi-year investment required. We're thrilled to be bringing this transformative project to life and can't wait to share the final results with our community.

These strategic goals will guide our efforts over the next three years as we continue to preserve and share the Duldig legacy.

A Remarkable Rediscovery

At our 2023 Founder's event, Eva de Jong-Duldig shared the exciting news of several items that have been rediscovered and returned to the Duldig Studio after many years. The most recent addition to our collection is a captivating piece by Karl Duldig titled La Mademoiselle D'or. Modelled in Singapore it was left behind when the Duldig family was deported to Australia as 'enemy aliens' in 1940. Recently rediscovered in Europe it was generously gifted to the Duldig Studio by Professor Yves Laisné of Paris in 2023. After 83 years it has finally found its way back home and the recording of Eva's talk has already been viewed by nearly 400 people.

A Heartfelt Thank You

On behalf of the Board, I would like to express our sincere gratitude to our Founder and Patron, Eva de Jong-Duldig, for her inspiration and unwavering support and dedication. We also extend our appreciation to our talented team: Museum Manager, Kate Prinsley, Collection & Facilities Manager, Stefan Damschke, Programs & Marketing Coordinators, Jess Murray and Bella Besen, Bookkeeper, Jane Tisdal and Curatorial & Research Associate, Melinda Mockridge. MUSEUM MANAGER'S REPORT

Throughout the past year the Duldig Studio has hummed with activity.

The wide range of opportunities to engage with the museum included: guided tours, free family days, workshops and musical performances. The vibrancy of our events and programs has seen our audiences and visitor numbers double year-on-year.

Of course, none of this could be achieved without the Duldig Studio volunteers who embraced the increased number of tours, visitor interest and programs with a sense of fun and absolute dedication to delivering the best possible experience for our visitors and guests.

This year with the support of two Victorian Government grants, Children's Week and Multicultural Festivals & Events, we were able to offer additional free programs. It was wonderful to welcome families from across Melbourne to our children's week family event in our Sculpture Garden, many of whom returned to participate in our holiday programs. Our gallery and garden absolutely buzzed with enjoyment when the pianist Alan Kogosowski presented a 'Slice of Vienna', a delightful performance of Viennese classics. Later in the year we welcomed audiences to a second concert 'Kogosowski Plays Gershwin' followed by afternoon tea in the Sculpture Garden. The warmth and joy of music adds to the many opportunities for creative engagement – the bedrock of the Duldig Studio. Both programs introduced new audiences to the Duldig family story and art.

Another highlight of the year was the launch of our monograph 'Slawa Horowitz-Duldig, Modernist Art & Design'. Beautifully designed by the award winning Pfisterer + Freeman this publication celebrates the creativity of Slawa Horowitz-Duldig – artist, designer, entrepreneur, teacher and inventor of the modern foldable umbrella. The book brings to light fresh research and archival material. On a warm spring evening we were so privileged that

our book was launched by the Austrian Honorary Consul General Mrs. Eva Hussain and toasted by almost 100 guests and supporters. The Annual Duldig Lecture on Sculpture was presented by Laurence Sillars of the Henry Moore Institute, United Kingdom. It attracted a large online attendance and demonstrated our ability to deliver online programs which introduce international experts to our local and overseas audiences.

This year we presented a number of Sunday afternoon public programs which included talks by sculptor Jennifer Mann and artist Peter Atkins. We contributed to Melbourne Design Week and brought together panels which included academics and former Board Members Alison Inglis AM and Georgina Walker. All our programs were beautifully rounded out with research and personal insight from Melinda Mockridge and Eva de Jong-Duldig.

Two significant collection projects were completed during the year. The Public Record Office archive and photograph project resulted in the scanning of over 300 photographs. This included 'The honeymoon series', the works of significant émigré photographers Wolfgang Seivers and Mark Strizic, and a selection of Karl Duldig's public commissions in Melbourne. The second project resulted in the conservation of two Singapore drawings supported by a National Library of Australia, Community Heritage Grant. Additionally, the collections team curated a new exhibition *Drawn from the Collection* which highlights the different techniques and styles of Karl Duldig and Slawa Horowitz-Duldig. This exhibition is particularly popular and relevant with Year 12 students studying the unit Art Making and Exhibiting. Both Stefan Damschke and Melinda Mockridge are thanked for so carefully and insightfully managing these projects.

It was wonderful to see our drawing workshops and Sunday sculpture workshops embed themselves into our regular programming. We enjoyed welcoming our cohorts of eager artists

on Tuesdays or Sundays – each and every one of them being inspired by the art around them and most importantly embarking on their own creative journey. Artist and teacher Helene Oberman, and Sculptor in Residence Stefan Damschke are greatly thanked for their inclusive and stimulating approaches to informal learning.

Audience development at the Duldig Studio is framed by our Audience Development Reference Group. This year we added 'wellbeing' to our objectives. We partnered with Australia's Chatty Café Scheme encouraging those seeking friendship to 'drop in' for coffee once a month; whilst the support of a Community Grant from the City of Stonnington enabled us to reprise our Still Firing program; taking sculpture workshops into local aged care facilities. These workshops encouraged socialisation, dexterity and artistic expression in aged care, and brought the arts to those with the least access. We are grateful to the City of Stonnington for supporting this project.

Work is underway to develop curriculum materials for years 9/10 studying the compulsory Holocaust Studies unit in Victorian Schools. It is very important that we tell this global story at a

local and personal level, and we thank Melinda Mockridge and Gina Panebianco for so thoughtfully developing our approach. We are grateful to the Vera Moore Foundation for helping fund our educational activities.

Over the course of 2023-2024 we were supported by a number of enthusiastic and capable Programs & Marketing Assistants and in particular we thank Jess Murray and Bella Besen for their contributions.

An Annual Review can only ever be a snapshot of a year. It doesn't capture the spirit, generosity and positive forces that make the Duldig Studio such a vibrant place. I thank our Board, volunteers, donors and supporters for their interest, enduring goodwill and help. We all have a commitment to making the Duldig Studio, its story and art, accessible to all and this year the organisation has continued to thrive.

FOUNDER'S MESSAGE

Eva de Jong-Duldig



PREDESTINATION OR FREEWILL

When I was at school we read Chaucer and ever since the question of 'predestination or freewill' has dwelled somewhere in my consciousness. When I think about the creation of the Duldig Studio and my part in it, my mind often returns to Chaucer. Which parts of my life were preordained, and which were the decisions over which I had a choice / freewill?

My parents and I were caught up in the tragic political upheaval of 20th century history and by some miracle we survived. Alongside our survival there was the further 'small miracle' of the survival of so many of the tangible remnants of my parents' lives in Vienna before the war. In Australia life for my parents was a constant struggle to make ends meet. Nevertheless, they succeeded in a remarkable way in remaining true to their artistic ideals.

I had the good fortune to grow up in a healthy and peaceful environment and although I lived with art all around me and it was often the topic of conversation this was not the world I was habituating as a young person. The key turning point was the death of my mother in 1975. Suddenly I found myself participating in the life and art of my father. This involvement enabled me to glean so much more about the history of my family through their wonderful Viennese art, the furniture and the other items that had once resided in our Viennese apartment. Most of all, however, I was able to study the many documents, letters and archives my mother had carefully preserved in the family home.

By the time my father died eleven years later my understanding of the art and history of my parents and the family story had taken root, but there was still much to learn and to undertake. Largely influenced by my mother's last words 'do not take anything out of this house', it was as if I was compelled to create a museum, and, in 1996, I completed the renovation and extension of the

residence and founded the Duldig Studio museum and art gallery.

There have been many milestones and achievements since then. Our house has become a vibrant public house museum that shares the legacy of my parents with local, national and international audiences. Memorable activities in 2023-2024 have included lectures and talks on aspects of the collection or connected to the Duldig family story; new exhibitions both in the Duldig Studio and in other venues; educational programs and classes as well as many varied visitor experiences. The internet has enabled our research work to be made available to wide audiences throughout the world, while simultaneously best practice is applied to conserve the collection. With so much happening it has clearly become imperative to undertake a second stage of development.

During 2023-2024 planning began for a new workshop and office together with a second floor artist's residence. The original Viennese furniture will be re-instated in the main bedroom and it will be opened to the public. Sorely needed additional storage space will be provided in the second bedroom. The new gallery will incorporate an accessible toilet and access to the Sculpture Garden will be improved.

On 28 November 2023, 123 years to the day after my mother's birth, the book 'Slawa Horowitz-Duldig, Modern Art & Design' was launched at the Duldig Studio by Jane Clarke. 92 Burke Road was conceived by Slawa as a museum long before it transitioned into one and it is fitting that her story should be published by 'her' museum. The book, which was first mooted in 2008, is not only a testament to Slawa but also to the authors, the designers and the many others behind the scenes who chose to contribute in so many ways. Foremost among these are Melinda Mockridge, overall editor as well as author of three chapters, Gina

Panebianco, coordinator of the publication and Alison Inglis who supported its realisation from the start. I would also like to thank Sue Coffey for her expert public relations support.

The book is also testament to the success of the Duldig Studio as a multi-award winning and sustainable entity that continues to punch above its weight. I am eternally grateful to the many wonderful people who have chosen to join me in this inspiring creative journey. Foremost among these are the members of the Board of Management under the presidency of Janine Kibblewhite. She has been supported by Gina Panebianco, Andrew Dixon, Antony de Jong, Angela James and Pralabh Gupta. I would also like to thank Kate Prinsley (Museum Manager), Stefan Damschke (Collections and Facilities Manager), Melinda Mockridge (Research and Curatorial Associate) and the many Volunteer Guides for their ongoing commitment beyond the call of duty.

In February 2024 I transferred the copyright of my memoir 'Driftwood: Escape and survival through art' to the Duldig Studio. This included the rights to the Audio-book which I have recently recorded and will be launched next year. The copyright to the Works in the collection were also transferred to the Duldig

Studio. These changes will secure the intellectual copyright of the tangible and intangible collection to the organisation into the future.

FOUNDER

On 22 June 2024 Christopher Allen's article 'How to house a museum' was published in the Weekend Australian, Christopher concludes:

A place animated by this feeling of artists at work, experimenting and feeling their way through different materials, media and styles, in a time characterized both by violent political and social turmoil and by a corresponding instability in the theory, practice and teaching of art. Above all the house is pervaded by a sense of the drama and pathos of a family that survived some of the most terrible events of the last century to find a safe haven in Australia and whose history, memory and work are carried on in this remarkable museum.

Let us be proud of what we have achieved and confident in the next phase of the museum's development.

Our freedom to choose shapes our destiny.

BOARD OF MANAGEMENT REPORT

The Board has pleasure in submitting the following Management Report for the year ended 30 June 2024.

Principal Activity

The principal activity of the organisation was the operation of a not-for-profit public museum and art gallery.

Results

In the full year of operation to 30 June 2024, the organisation's surplus from activities was \$211,013 and its net assets as at 30 June

2024 were \$4,519,580 Further details are contained in the financial performance summary and the Duldig Gallery Inc Financial Reports.

The income of the organisation is exempt from Income Tax as it is endorsed as a Deductible Gift Recipient (DGR), and as an Income Tax Exempt Charity (ITEC).

Review of Operations

During the year the organisation supported arts events, public programs, workshops, visitors and group tours. 


